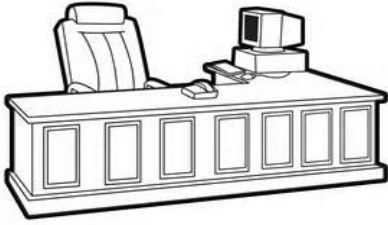

From Fr. JC Maximilian's Desk "The Goodness of Human Labor"

I doubt that there are many of us who get as excited about going to work as Dymphna, my dog. I ask her, "You want to go to work?" and she immediately runs to the door, wagging her tail. You just have to ask Mariana, Trish, Pat, Jean, or Paul about how excited Dymphna is when she gets to the office. She runs from person to person, jumping with joy and twirling her head. Of course, I suspect that she has an easier job than most of us: she lays in the sun, cuddles with Mariana and Trish, sleeps on the chair in Pat's office (and tries to steal her cheese), and plays with Paul.

As we celebrate Labor Day weekend, it is only fitting for us to reflect on the value of Human Labor. How do we look at work? At first glance it might look as if work is a punishment for Original Sin. After all, after the Fall in the Garden, God did say, "Cursed is the ground because of you! In toil you shall eat its yield all the days of your life" (Genesis 3: 17), and "By the sweat of your brow you shall eat bread," (Genesis 3:19). So, is work – human labor – just a curse because of our disobedience to God?

If we go a bit earlier in Genesis, however, we see that God intended human beings to work right from the start; "God blessed them and God said to them: Be fertile and multiply; fill the earth and subdue it. Have dominion over the fish of the sea, the birds of the air, and all the living things that crawl on the earth" (Genesis 1:28). Rather than being a curse, human work is part of the original blessing of being created in God's image and likeness. Human labor is a duty as we hear in St. Paul's second letter to the Thessalonians, "If any one will not work, let him not eat" (3:10). However, it is a duty which should bring deep joy as our work honors the gifts and talents that God has given us. Our work can also be redemptive; "By enduring the hardship of work in union with Jesus, the carpenter of Nazareth and the one crucified on Calvary, man collaborates in a certain fashion with the Son of God in his redemptive work. He shows himself to be a disciple of Christ by carrying the cross, daily, in the work he is called to accomplish" (Catechism of the Catholic Church #2427).

Through the work that they do, people exercise and fulfill in part the potential inscribed in their nature. The value of human labor stems from our very nature as human beings, that is why it is important to keep the proper attitude towards our work by remembering that work is for Man, not Man for work.

Because of the great dignity that the Church attaches to human labor, many Popes have written on the rights and duties of workers. At the most basic level, everyone should be able to draw the means of providing for their life and that of their family from their work, and work should also be aimed at serving the whole human community.

So this Labor Day weekend, as you enjoy a cookout with your family and friends, as your kids enjoy the last weekend before school gets into full swing, take sometime to reflect on the dignity that you have as a worker, and how you can direct your work, including its difficulties, towards the greater glory of God and the welfare of our community.

Are YOU Just an Idle Bystander?



Jesus has the people's attention in today's Gospel. Jesus uses tough language when he addresses his captive audience, and *names several conditions that*

would eliminate someone from being his disciple. He was explaining, in the most explicit terms that following him means more than just tagging along to see what he was going to do next.

Followers could not just be idle bystanders, NO!! He was being very clear about what the life of a disciple would mean.



It may sound disturbing to hear Jesus suggest we are supposed to "hate" members of our family. That word has a different connotation today than it did back in Jesus' day. The people would have understood that Jesus meant that we cannot be completely tied to other people if we are going to follow Jesus.

He also tells us that we must renounce "all" our possessions. No matter what, we are to put God first. Throughout his ministry, Jesus always puts loving and serving his Father above all else. He asks us to do the same. Jesus warns us that it will not be easy being his disciple. We will always have crosses to carry and we have to do that willingly

Adult: I must be very conscious and make a decision to travel with Jesus. I will become attuned to God's wisdom and find great joy and peace in our lives through Him that saves!

Child: It is kind of like putting my friends first, instead of my parents.

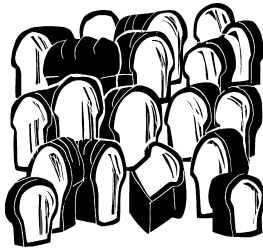

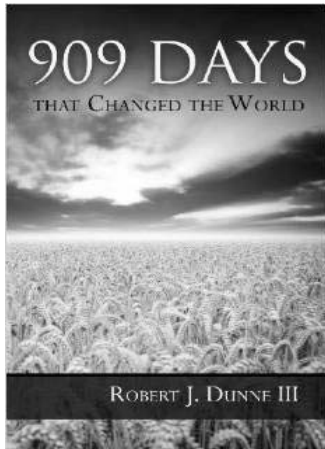

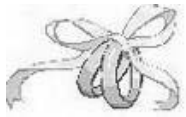
In the Parish Center Foyer

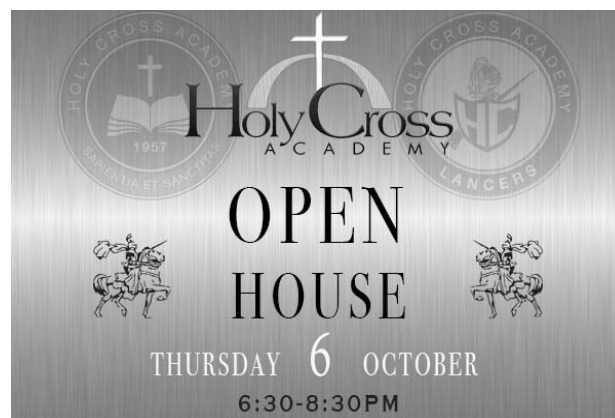


STORY TIME AT THE ST. MAX LIBRARY

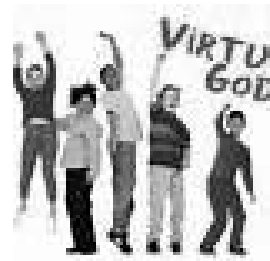


"I used to think that I am not the one who should be teaching since I felt that I didn't know 'all the
