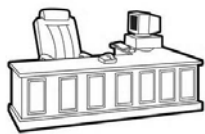

From Fr. JC Maximilian's Desk "Faithful Citizenship"

The American patriot, Samuel Adams once wrote, "Neither the wisest constitution nor the wisest laws will secure the liberty and happiness of a people whose manners are universally corrupt. He therefore is the truest friend to the liberty of his country who tries most to promote its virtue, and who, so far as his power and influence extend, will not suffer a man to be chosen into any office of power and trust who is not a wise and virtuous man."

I am not sure about all of you, but to me it seems that we are far from the virtue that Adams says we need in order to secure our liberty and happiness. It seems that for the two major party candidates for the highest office in the land have reduced themselves to basically name calling, and both seem to have scandals hovering over them. What is a faithful Catholic to do?

I am not going to tell you who to vote for or who not to vote for. Rather I am going to remind you that voting is a moral action, and like any moral action we must base our decision on a well-formed conscience. At the start of such a well-formed conscience is remembering that while we are citizens of the United States of America, we are first and foremost citizens of Christ's Heavenly Kingdom, and the values of that kingdom should take priority in our decision making. This is what St. Augustine wrote about in his classic book, *The City of God*.

While I will recommend reading St. Augustine, it is a very long book so you would not likely be able to read it before Election Day to help you form your conscience. Fortunately, there is a shorter and much more relevant document that you can read published by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB), "Forming Consciences for a Faithful Citizenship." I have attached a PDF of that document on the parish's website, www.resurrection2.org, if you would like to download and read it, which I strongly recommend. I just want to highlight a few general points that the Bishops talk about in forming one's conscience.

First, the Bishops remind us that as Catholics we are not single-issue voters. A candidate's position on a single issue is not sufficient to guarantee a voter's support. Yet if a candidate's position on a single issue promotes an intrinsically evil act, such as legal abortion... a voter may legitimately disqualify a candidate from receiving support (no. 42). As Catholics our first loyalty is to God and his Church, not to any political establishment.

"Catholics have a serious and lifelong obligation to form their consciences in accord with human reason and the teaching of the Church. Conscience is not something that allows us to justify doing whatever we want, nor is it a mere "feeling" about what we should or should not do. Rather, conscience is the voice of God resounding in the human heart, revealing the truth to us and calling us to do what is good while shunning what is evil" (no. 17). The Bishops go to say, "The formation of conscience includes several elements. First, there is a desire to embrace goodness and truth. For Catholics, this begins with a willingness and openness to seek the truth and what is right by studying Sacred Scripture and the teaching of the Church as contained in the Catechism of the Catholic Church. It is also important to examine the facts and background information about various choices.

Finally, prayerful reflection is essential to discern the will of God. Catholics must also understand that if they fail to form their consciences in the light of the truths of the faith and the moral teachings of the Church they can make erroneous judgments" (no. 18).

The Bishops then discuss the 4 Principles of Catholic Social Teaching: the Dignity of the Human Person, Subsidiarity, the Common Good, and Solidarity. I do not have the room to explain each of these so let me just provide how they are defined in the [Compendium of the Social Doctrine of the Church](#).

Dignity of the Human Person: Human life is sacred, as it is made in the "image and likeness of God." Direct attacks on innocent persons are never morally acceptable, at any stage or in any condition.

Subsidiarity: The principle of subsidiarity reminds us that larger institutions in society should not overwhelm or interfere with smaller or local institutions, yet larger institutions have essential responsibilities when the more local institutions cannot adequately protect human dignity, meet human needs, and advance the common good.

Common Good: The common good indicates "the sum total of social conditions which allow people, either as groups or as individuals, to reach their fulfillment more fully and more easily" (*Gaudium et Spes*, no. 26).

Solidarity: Solidarity highlights in a particular way the intrinsic social nature of the human person, the equality of all in dignity and rights and the common path of individuals and peoples towards an ever more committed unity. . . . Solidarity must be seen above all in its value as a moral virtue that determines the order of institutions. On the basis of this principle the "structures of sin" (*Sollicitudo Rei Socialis*, nos. 36, 37) that dominate relationships between individuals and peoples must be overcome.

Contact Your Assemblyman and State Senator Regarding Assisted Suicide Bill.

On Oct. 6, 2016, the Assembly Appropriations Committee released Assembly Bill 2451 which would make assisted suicide legal in New Jersey. A2451 could be voted on in the General Assembly in the near future. An identical bill (S2474) has been introduced in the Senate.

This assisted suicide bill is a direct threat to anyone viewed as a cost liability to an insurance company. In an era of cost control and managed care, patients with lingering illnesses may be branded as an economic liability, and decisions to encourage death could be driven by cost.

The facts are clear; in California, in Vermont and in Oregon – states that have passed assisted suicide bills – insurance companies have denied individuals healthcare coverage, but offered them low-cost drugs to end their lives.

To All of the Good People of Resurrection,

A major endowment campaign is currently underway at Resurrection and throughout the Diocese of Trenton. This week I will be sharing the diocesan components of the Faith to Move Mountains Campaign for the Diocese and our parish.

Our Parishes - \$30 Million

A minimum of 30%, or \$22.5 million, of the funds collected at the parish level will remain at the individual parish to address their own local needs. Once a parish has reached its goal, the allocation of funds will reverse and the parish will receive 70% of all additional monies collected. Additional funds will provide an endowment for parishes experiencing critical financial circumstances (\$7.5 million).

Ordained Ministry - \$20 Million

- Increase the current endowment for our retired clergy who have dedicated their lives to their parish communities. In the next 10 years alone, 44% of our priests will be eligible for retirement!
- Supplement current and future education costs for our growing class of seminarians, as it costs approximately \$40,000 to educate one seminarian for one year.
- Expand the diaconate program to serve communities requiring excellent homilies, sacramental preparation and spiritual direction.

Catholic Schools - \$15 Million

- Provide additional sponsorships for “seats” at a school reflecting the total cost of educating the student, which has risen to nearly \$7,000 each year.
- Support our “Mission Schools,” which serve underprivileged children from ethnically diverse communities with limited access to a quality Catholic education.
- Provide administrative and operational support to continue building the Catholic Alumni Partnership (CAP) program, which has already raised more than \$180,000 for tuition assistance, technology upgrades, and local campus needs since its launch in 2013.

Catechesis and Evangelization - \$5 Million

- Provide financial assistance for full certification for all of our catechists and scholarship assistance for parish leaders (DRE’s, Youth Directors, etc.) so that all serving in this role will have or be pursuing a master’s degree in such programs as pastoral theology, ministry, and liturgy.
- Support the organized training of adult formation teams, strengthen existing programs, or create new ones at each parish.
- Build a comprehensive network upon our parish evangelization ministries in order to empower every parish community to deepen the spiritual lives of its people, reach out to those who have left the Church, and welcome all those who are coming to the faith for the first time.

Social Services - \$5 Million

- Award grants to parishes and Catholic Social Service agencies to respond to the increasing needs of those struggling in their communities.
- Provide professional assistance to parishes with a critical need for counseling services among their parishioners suffering from addiction, loss of a loved one, divorce, and other mental health issues.

In the coming weeks, I will share further details about how the campaign funds will directly impact our Diocese and our community here at Resurrection. Thank you for your continued prayers and support.

Every year we witness heartbreak because the sponsor the Candidate chose is not able to obtain a Sponsor Certificate from their Parish. Prepare ahead and make sure a sponsor candidate is qualified! Parents help your children understand the reasons why we require the following:

SPONSOR QUALIFICATIONS:

To be a sponsor for Baptism or Confirmation, you must: Be a practicing Catholic!!!!!!!

1. Not be the parent of the child/candidate
2. Must be at least 16 years of age
3. A Roman Catholic who has received the Sacraments of Baptism, Eucharist, and Confirmation.
4. A registered member of a parish.
5. A practicing Catholic, who participates at Mass, receives Reconciliation regularly and believes and lives according to the teachings of the Church.
6. (If married) Must be married according to the laws of the Catholic Church and living in a valid marriage. Persons who are divorced but not remarried outside the Church and not living with someone outside of marriage, are eligible.
