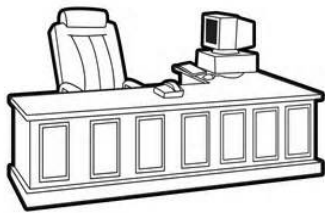

From Fr. JC Maximilian's Desk "Order of Christian Funeral"

Last week I wrote in general about why we, as Christians, give such attention to remembering the dead. It our faith that God created us to be both body and soul, and therefore we need to respect the body both during life, and after death.

In order to exercise this respect for the faithful departed, the Church has a number of liturgical rites which as Catholics we should have done when we die. I want to emphasize this, because it is becoming too common for children not to have the Rites of Christian Funeral performed when their parents die. Sadly, too many adult children do not place much value on religious belief, and they want to save money by just having a wake at the funeral home, and skip the Mass of Christian Burial. I would ask that all of you make it very clear to your family what you want when you die. Burying the dead is a very serious obligation of the Faithful; it is one of the Corporal Works of Mercy.

The first of the Rites of the Church for the Faithful departed is the Vigil. This is typically done the night before the funeral Mass. It is usually done at the funeral parlor, although it can be done in the church or even at the family's home.

This is when many of the deceased person's family and friends come to "pay their respects" to the family. It is at the Vigil that the Christian community keeps watch with the family in prayer to God, and we seek strength in Christ's presence. It is the first occasion to turn to God's Word as a source of faith and hope, "as light and life in the face of darkness and death." The Vigil is the best time to share stories and memories of the deceased, so it is at this rite that it is best to have the eulogy. The Rite of the Vigil for the Deceased is made up of the welcome/introduction, the liturgy of the Word, prayers of intercession, and then a concluding blessing. It is usually presided over by a deacon or a priest, although in times of need, a trained member of the laity may also lead the prayers.

The funeral liturgy is the central liturgical celebration of the Christian community for the faithful departed. This is the funeral Mass. The preference of the Church is always for the funeral Mass, since the Eucharist is the source and summit of the Christian life, but there may be situations when a funeral liturgy outside of Mass might be more appropriate.

The funeral liturgy is the time for the family and friends of the deceased to give praise and thanks to God for Jesus' victory over sin and death, to commend the deceased to God's mercy, and to seek strength in the proclamation of the Paschal Mystery. It is an affirmation of our belief that through baptism we share in Christ's death and resurrection, and can look forward to the day when all the elect will be raised up and united in the Kingdom of God. The structure of the funeral liturgy begins with the reception of the body at the church, which is followed by the liturgy of the Word. If it is a funeral Mass, then comes the liturgy of the Eucharist, and it is concluded by the Final Commendation and Farewell.

The last rite of the Church for the Faithful departed is the Rite of Committal. It is the last act of the community of faith in caring for the body of its deceased member. It is celebrated at the grave, tomb, or crematorium. "In committing the body to its resting place, the community expresses the hope that, with all those who have gone before marked with the sign of faith, the deceased awaits the glory of the resurrection." It also expresses our belief in the communion that exists between the Church on earth (Church Militant) and the Church in purgatory (Church Suffering), and the Church in Heaven (Church Triumphant).

Whenever we reach out to those who are less

fortunate, extend compassion to those that hurt us or offer prayers for someone who hurts us or are suffering we make God visible in different ways! Is he YOUR King?

Adult: Jesus you are my King. Help me to follow you and put you first in my life.....

Child: Jesus, you showed compassion for others when you were dying on the cross. Help me to follow you and show compassion to those in need.

An important notice to all birth parents who placed babies for adoption

New Jersey Adoption Law has changed. Beginning Jan. 1, 2017, adoptees and certain relatives will be able to obtain a copy of an original birth certificate without a court order. Birth parents who wish to preserve their privacy must submit a Redaction Request Form to the New Jersey Department of Health no later than Dec. 31, 2016. 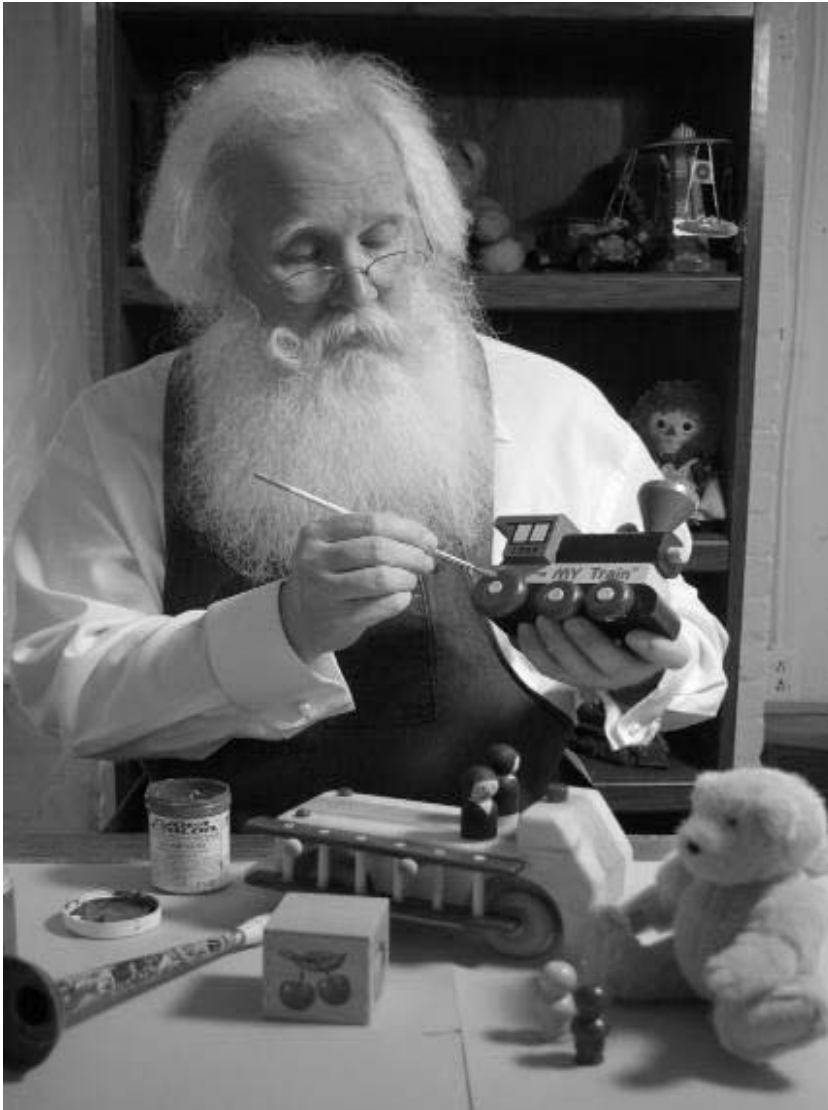

A Lesson on Thanksgiving

Eucharist as Thanksgiving



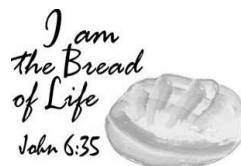
Eucharist means first of all "thanksgiving" (CCC, 1360). I can think of no better lesson to teach to our students this Thanksgiving week than this. There are many images that express the intense mystery that is the Eucharist, but the Eucharist as

thanksgiving is the most appropriate for November. A simple connection that you can help your students make is that every time we celebrate the Eucharist, we share a Thanksgiving meal.

The word Eucharist comes from "the Greek words eucharistein and eulogein, which recall the Jewish blessings that proclaim - especially during a meal - God's works: creation, redemption, and sanctification" (CCC, 1328). We are united as one body, one family sharing in the one bread and one cup of Christ

Many people assume that the United States has celebrated Thanksgiving Day since the time of the pilgrims as a sign of thanksgiving for the harvest season. This is not exactly true. President Abraham Lincoln instituted the holiday in 1863 during the Civil War. However, he did not have the harvest in mind. He wanted Americans to celebrate the holiday as a sign of unity and thanksgiving to God.

"I do therefore invite my fellow citizens in every part of the United States, and also those who are at sea and those who are sojourning in foreign lands, to set apart and observe the last Thursday of November next, as a day of Thanksgiving and Praise to our beneficent Father who dwelleth in the Heavens" (President Abraham Lincoln, October 3, 1863).



I can think of no American holiday that so closely resembles the symbolism and meaning of the sacrament of the Eucharist. We celebrate

Thanksgiving as a sign of American unity and thanksgiving to God who has given us great gifts.
